

Not having a teacher, I wandered around even more than I had on recorder and, sorry to say, even wandered around from teacher to teacher. I have not landed as well on gamba as I did on

recorder, but I certainly have not given up. As the Covid situation improved, I was fortunate enough to start playing with some small groups on recorder and bass gamba. That felt sooooo good!
