This Month's Session:

At this month's session, Tom Riis will lead the group working through a series of instrumental motets by two great masters of the late Renaissance, William Byrd (1543-1623) and Hans Leo Hassler (1564-1612). Celebrated in their day at home and abroad, Byrd and Hassler were revered equally as superior craftsmen and expressive artists. Each created a large number of secular works and sacred music beloved by both Catholics and Protestants despite the contentious religious strife surrounding them at the time. Tom will book-end the workshop with some lighter movements by Will Ayton of Rhode Island, a modern master composer and arranger for voices, viols, and recorders.

Tom Riis has served as Professor of Musicology and Director of the American Music Research Center at the University of Colorado Boulder since 1992. His research publications are

mostly devoted to American musical theater. (His book Just Before Jazz: Black Musical Theater in New York. 1890 to 1915 received an ASCAP-Deems Taylor Award in 1995.) But he has been a performing musician since taking up the cello at age of ten, has sung in church, school, and community choirs for as long as he can remember, and began playing the viola da gamba in graduate school. From 1981 to 1990, he was the director of early music ensembles at the University of Georgia (in Athens) and helped to a found both the Athens Masters Chorale and a Renaissance chamber choir called Voix Fort Claires.

Our Leader for the April 8th Meeting: Carla Sciaky

Carla Sciaky received her first recorder for her eleventh birthday, a hand-medown from a distant cousin. Magically, her father had an identical one, and together they navigated the Trapp Family instruction book for beginners. She discovered the joy of duets and the rapture of mastering the tunes that present the biggest challenges. In college she studied under Dr. Gordon Sandford at the University of Colorado in Boulder, performing for three years in the Collegium Musicum under his directorship. During that time she added rebec, viola da gamba, and a few recorder-related reed instruments to her menagerie. After completing her BA. she moved to Denver and performed through the next decade with the Dufay Consort, including a critically acclaimed Carnegie Recital Hall debut, the Platte River Consort, and Diverse Passions. During that time she was coached on tenor viol by Sarah Cunningham at the Castle Hill Early Music Workshop, and by Laura Jeppesen and Judith Davidoff in their private studios. Following an extended detour into an allencompassing career in the folk music domain, followed by several more years of raising her children, she has in recent years returned to the world of early music. Carla has been a core member of the Baroque Chamber Orchestra of

Colorado since their first season, and has performed with Colorado Chamber Players, the Denver Early Music Consort, Golden Viols, Regis University Collegium, Denver Eclectic Concerts, and more. As a folksinger/ songwriter, she appears on many local stages as well as in the more intimate house concert setting. In addition, she is working on a book project and launching a business in the healing arts. She makes her home in the Washington Park neighborhood of Denver with her husband and their labradoodle Bella.

Due to the war, he was forced to flee to Austria and then later to northern Germany. It was in Germany that he joined a mandolin orchestra where only Tablature was used. His grandmother bought him an accordion and he had two lessons. He excitedly showed his skill at reading music to his mandolin teacher, who reacted by promptly kicking him out of the mandolin orchestra.

Bill immigrated to the United States in 1956, settling in Yonkers. There he learned to play the euphonium, performing Rhapsody in Blue at his first high school concert. Bill began playing the recorder in the 70s when he joined the DRS. His membership was interrupted for a period of time by a move to Florida.

Recorder Faire



Music and Dances of the British Isles and Beyond

Thomas Ravenscroft, Robert Johnson, and others found inspiration and humor within the pastoral English countryside. Participate in the melodious minglings of ravens, frogs, mice, and maidens as we explore the songs, phansies, and other instrumental pieces of the English Renaissance. All instruments welcome.

1:30 p.m. - 4:30 p.m. Ann Marie Morgan: Pavans and Galliards

Explore the world of two dances originating in the 15th and 16th centuries. Follow the progression as the music evolves from an accompaniment for dancers into its own highly complex musical form in the early 17th century. The pavan (also known as *padovana, paduana*, and other names) and galliard began life as simple social dances. They spread throughout Europe, and became often paired in a kind of musical marriage: the dignified pavan with the sprightly galliard. They evolved too by growing musically more complex. Long after the dance steps had gone out of fashion, pavan and galliard music continued to be written, played and enjoyed. All instruments welcome.

JENNIFER CARPENTER holds a Bachelor of Music degree in clarinet performance from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and a Master of Music degree in musicology and early music performance from the University of North Texas. Jennifer received a Toulouse Graduate Fellowship toward her Ph.D. studies in musicology and early music performance at the University of North Texas, where she is ABD. As a recorder player, she performs as a soloist and in ensembles, including with Colorado's own **Parish House Baroque**, and has been a guest artist with

the Dallas Bach Society and Texas Camerata. Jennifer is on the board of directors of the American Recorder Society and was the music director of the Dallas Recorder Society. She has also been on the faculty of early music workshops and chapter meetings in Colorado as well as in Texas and California.

Violist da gamba and Baroque 'cellist ANN MARIE **MORGAN** is active internationally as a soloist, chamber musician and recording artist. A frequent guest with major orchestras and choral societies, she has been viola da gamba soloist in Bach's St. Matthew and St. John Passions with the Philadelphia and the Minnesota Orchestras, and she has played at Bach Festivals in Oregon, Bethlehem (PA), as well as in Europe at the Prague Spring Festival. In addition to concerts and recordings with her Colorado ensemble, Olde Friends, she has performed and recorded with many other early music groups including the Baltimore Consort, Tempesta di Mare, and the Dallas Bach Society. She can be heard on two dozen recordings, including a solo viola da gamba CD, titled Among Rosebuds, of works by French and English composers. Ann Marie teaches privately and coaches both vocal and instrumental period ensembles in the Denver/ Boulder area.

Ann Marie's involvement gives us the opportunity to expand our compass to invite players of viol and 'cello to attend this workshop—where we will have a viol expert who knows recorder, and a recorder expert who also plays viol.
